## THANK YOU FOR YOUR INPUT!

Thank you to all who participated in the Library's Community Planning Sessions this fall. At these sessions, different proposals for our expanded facility were presented. Thanks to your input, we have been able to refine our proposed facility to make it not only the best library of our size in the western suburbs, but especially the best library for the residents of Winfield.

Overcrowding of the current facility and the continued population growth of Winfield prompted the Library Board of Trustees to start the process of planning for a new library several years ago. In order to serve the growing population of Winfield through at least the year 2030, the library hired Fred Schlipf, building consultant and director of the Urbana Free Library in Urbana, Illinois, to develop a building program. Mr. Schlipf's program is recommending a facility of approximately 34,000 square feet of space. You may view a copy of this program at the library's circulation desk.

Currently, the library is working with Engberg Anderson Design Partnership of Milwaukee, Wisconsin to develop a conceptual design for an expanded facility. We have developed a display in the lobby of the library with drawings of the proposed building, a summary of the building program, and a comment box. We encourage all residents of Winfield to share their thoughts about our plans.
